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Supply Chain Manager

Supply chain managers **plan and manage all activities** involved in sourcing and procurement, conversion, and logistics management. Importantly, this also includes coordination and collaboration with channel partners, who can be suppliers, intermediaries, third-party service providers, and customers.





Logistics Manager

Logistics managers **supervise the in-bound and outbound movement, distribution, and shipping of a company's inventory -** typically raw materials, parts and products. They plan transportation and distribution routes, direct fleets, analyze budgets, and process shipments. Logistics managers also supervise many warehouse functions, creating optimal receipt, dispatching and storage procedures.



Materials Manager

Materials managers **support the complete material flow cycle** - from purchase to planning and control of work in process to the finished product. Organizations depend on effective materials managers to ensure that available goods can satisfy customer demand, minimize waste, manage inventory levels and keep output in line with the company's balance sheet.

Buyer Planner


